From the Principal ...

Welcome to Week 5, where we have well and truly settled into our 27 new classes and a new year of learning.

It has been amazing to see how quickly our students connected with their 2021 teachers and engaged in new learning. Our teachers have been busily completing assessments and initial activities to ensure they get to know all of their new class members. Classrooms are buzzing along extremely well and students have been enjoying the challenge of new and exciting work. The huge amount of time staff put in at the end of 2020 to create the new classes for this year has certainly paid off.

Even though our Kindergarten students have been here for a few weeks now, I can officially welcome them all to the Governor family. Our 93 students are very confident and are demonstrating how much they are enjoying being at school and engaged in learning. Thank you to our new kindergarten parents for assisting in us in the procedures for morning drop-off and afternoon collection of students. It has been a positive start to school for our newest and youngest students.

I would like to stress the importance of all children attending school every day and on time. The start of a new school year is a great time to establish good habits and routines that will set children up for a successful year of learning at school. School starts at 8:50am and children commence learning straight away. When children are late, it not only disrupts their own learning, but also that of their classmates as teachers need to stop and re-explain tasks or instructions. We understand there will be times that children are unable to come to school, or may arrive late on the rare occasion. We ask that these be kept to the minimum. Please communicate with the school either by letter, email, or phone, if your child is away or if absences will be ongoing. School attendance for school age children is compulsory and a legal requirement for all parents and guardians. However, please remember that at the moment students must not come to school if they are unwell. Even with very mild symptoms. If they develop flu like symptoms they will require a negative COVID-19 test before returning to school.

Congratulations to our Parliamentarians who were recently involved in our Parliament Training Day. This is always a great opportunity for our newly elected students to develop skills which will assist them throughout the year as leaders. We were also able to present these students with their official uniform which they will wear for all Parliament sessions, assemblies and special occasions. Thank you to Ms. Stojanoska for working so hard to organise the uniforms and having them arrive so quickly for our students.

Our new outdoor learning space is finished and in use. The new gazebo area looks amazing and our students are enjoying the extra space during recess and lunch. This space is also being utilised by teachers during the day as an extra space to enjoy learning outside of the classroom environment. We have students who ride their bikes to school. GPK wants to ensure that their well-being is at the forefront. Parents it is a condition that if students ride a bike or scooter to school, they MUST wear a helmet.



Bicycle riders are required by law to wear an approved helmet securely fitted and fastened. In NSW there are no exemptions from wearing an approved bicycle helmet. Research conducted by the University of NSW in 2016 involving 64,000 injured cyclists found helmet use was associated with about a 50 per cent reduction in head injuries of any severity, about a 70 per cent reduction in serious head injuries and 65 per cent reduction in fatal head injuries. A bicycle helmet that is not correctly fitted and fastened does not provide enough protection in a crash.

Arriving on time is really important for our students as important information is given to them first thing in the morning. This is followed by the class's morning routine which is vital consolidation of what is being taught. It is crucial that children establish good routines and habits in preparation for the rest of their lives. Punctuality is a life skill that they need to develop whilst they are young.
